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


#### 20TH ANNIVERSARY ANNUAL REPORT

#### "I Have a Clear Path Now"

It's hard to be a single parent of four kids, and it's a challenge.

When my youngest, Dustin, was born in 1996, he had a heart murmur. My MFSS home visitor helped show me how to handle his kind of sickness, and made sure I understood the directions for giving his medications. She also helped with forms I needed to fill-in. Since I've been playing the part of both a mommy and a daddy for the last three years, I had to pick it up real quick, and I'm still at it.

There are a lot of other things that my worker, Claudia, taught me. For instance, how to teach Dustin different colors and his ABCs. It's like Claudia said, it's a game

that you play with your kids, and the more games you play, the more alert they get.

I first heard about MFSS through my doctor. I think if MFSS hadn't helped me, I'd still be at square one. But by talking to Claudia, all of my anger came out. She advised me to calm down, look forward, and think about my kids. Of all the agencies I went to, I got the most leadership and understanding from MFSS. But it's not only the agency that helps you, you have to help yourself. They can guide you, they can give you all the advice they want, but it's you yourself that has to follow-up. And the only way I can accomplish things is by looking forward, not back. Put all that happens to you in the back, and just go straight ahead. If I can do it, I know that a lot of other single parents can do it too.

We have family discussion every Wednesday. Everything comes out on the table. Dislikes, likes, what the kids are looking forward to, their future. My big girl wants to be an attorney. My advice to her is, "Go for that goal. Don't let anyone tell you that you can't make it. Don't let yourself down, go for it." My older son wants to be a policeman. I told him that in order to be a policeman, you have to study hard, and you have to stay out of trouble. He's doing a good job on it. My little girl, she wants to someday be a nurse or a doctor. Dustin wants to be a policeman too. To see that happen, I have to coach them the right way. I always say to my kids. "You can do it."

Right now, my personal situation is more stable than what it was a few years ago. I've been through the worst already. I have a clear path now. Claudia comes to visit us regularly and calls to find out how things are going. I'm happy. Dustin is doing good now. I want him to go to school as soon as possible—he's signed up for Headstart.

My kids can say that I never walked out of their lives. From the hard times we went through until now, I stayed with them.


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

## Maui Mental Health Association and the Beginning of MFSS

The celebration of Maui Family Support Services' 20th year Anniversary of community service, would not be complete without recognition of how it all began.

In 1978 the Mental Health Association in Maui (MHA/Maui) organized a task force in response to the increased number of child abuse reports. Using seed money from the Hawaii Family Support Center (HFSC) in Honolulu, a Maui Family Support Services (MFSS) desk, staffed by a Vista volunteer, was placed in the MHA/Maui office. The HFSC sent two trainers to Maui to give trainings and develop screening procedures.

By October 17, 1980, MFSS had grown and was granted a charter as a nonprofit corporation. From these early beginnings, MFSS has continued to grow and serve the families and children of our community.

The Mental Health Association in Maui is a nonprofit citizen's organization that receives no government funds so the they will be free to advocate for better care and treatment for people suffering from mental illness. Education to help remove the stigma usually associated with mental illnesses is a major role of the Association. The MHA/Maui is located at 95 Mahalani St., Wailuku. They can be reached at 242-6461.

#### **Healthy Start**

The Hawaii Healthy Start Program focuses on three major goals in the development of healthy children and families, and has become an international model.

The goals include increasing parenting skills such as methods of coping, importance of nurturing and positive nonviolent discipline; teaching parents about stages of child development and methods of encouraging optimal development; assisting parents in learning to problem solve and access community resources to alleviate stressors such as domestic violence, homelessness and lack of health insurance.

There is special emphasis on health care practices such as timely immunizations, family planning, early prenatal care, and proper dental habits. Families may enroll during pregnancy or until the infant is 90 days old. Home based services are available on Maui and Lanai and may continue until the child is five years old.

#### **Family Focus**

Available to any Maui family with one or more children up to the age of five, Family Focus is an early intervention program aimed at strengthening and supporting families. Assistance is provided through home visiting services and/or information and referral to additional community resources.

Family Focus staff helps strengthen families by promoting good health, positive child development, parent-child interaction and improved parenting skills. They assist parents to create stable, nurturing home environments which reduce family stress.

#### Early Head Start (EHS)

A Maui and Lanai program with continuous enrollment, Early Head Start is open to low income, pregnant women and families with children up to three years old. Efforts are made to enroll families with special needs children.

Designed to enhance children's physical, social, emotional and cognitive development, EHS works to enable parents to be better caregivers of, and teachers to, their children. The program also works to assist parents in reaching their own goals, such as economic independence.

Parental involvement is critical to the program's decision-making process and parents participate on the Policy Council and Parent Committees.

#### **Early Identification Team**

The Early Identification (EID) team is on the job seven days a week. At Maui Memorial Medical Center, EID facilitators talk to all new parents who consent to assessments of their strengths, needs and concerns. The Team accepts referrals from physicians, professionals or other community resources.

When appropriate, the family may be offered MFSS home visitation services and given a prenatal

## Parents as First Teachers (PAFT)

The focus of the Parents As First Teachers (PAFT) program is on preparing parents to be their child's first teacher. This is accomplished through parent education, training and developmental assessments.

Child development staff present classes to MFSS Family Facilitators and prepares projects that promote parent-child interaction and benefit child development. Facilitators use these projects in their home visits, working directly with parents and children. Such activities may center on art with the use of colors, shapes and symbols or learning through music.

#### Maui County Early Childhood Resource Team (MCECRT)

The Maui County Early Childhood Resource Team believes that the early years of a child's life are critically important to his/her healthy growth and development and eventual success in school and later years. Therefore, the team, along with a local community council, strives to improve the availability, affordability and quality of early care and education for children, from birth to five years old,

Current projects include, an accreditation mentor project for early childhood programs, child care subsidies to working families, a family education project at Makawao School, childbirth "reunion" classes, start up help for new playgroups and assistance to licensed and unlicensed child care providers and programs. #### **Lanai Perinatal Services**

Parents as First Teachers

Due to the lack of birthing facilities on Lanai, this unique outreach Service has been designed to be available to all pregnant women on the island. Services include early identification of pregnancy, education about prenatal care and planning for birth, which are all essential for a healthy delivery.

Through weekly contact and monthly visits, MFSS staff offers pregnant women a trusting relationship, coordinates services with other care agencies, and addresses health risks that can be minimized through appropriate medical care, good nutrition and health habits, not using detrimental substances and childbirth education.

Follow-up after birth involves teaching parents about child development, parenting skills, family planning and the importance of regular medical health practices such as immunizations and checkups.





#### **Violence Hurts!**

Violence of all kinds, including child abuse, has increased dramatically over the years. Experiencing violence creates fear, which can have negative effects on a child's developing brain, creating learning problems. Our children are flooded with harmful messages these days, in their own (or neighbor's) homes, through television, and with their friends. These harmful messages hurt everyone.

What gets passed on to our children is important. We each have a part to play in making sure children have good examples to follow as they grow up. Children learn from us by watching what we do and listening to what we say. Whether we're single or married, young or old, well-off or struggling, we can do something to curb violence and make a difference. Remember, the more often children see positive behaviors, such as people being friendly and cooperative, the more likely it is that they will copy them.

Have you ever thought about what children might be learning from you? Do you promote harm or violence of any kind? Use the list below to check your attitudes and actions – ask yourself whether you do some of these things:

- I take time to find out what the messages are in the books I read to children and the video games I buy for them.
- I am careful not to over-expose children to violent or adult-rated movies.
- I am careful not to use my size to control or intimidate children.
- I am careful to minimize the amount of time, money and attention I give to movies and other forms of entertainment that show violence.
- I avoid exposing family members to suggestions of violence. For example, I don't buy toys designed for violent use, such as guns.

Be sure you're doing all you can to eliminate violence in your home and neighborhood.

#### "Humans are basically good"

I grew up with the philosophy that *humans are basically good*. Over time, experience has shown me that this basic goodness can get buried under the stresses of life. We all know the stress of overwork and financial worry, while substance abuse and unemployment are growing community concerns. For many families, the additional stress of a new child leaves parents overwhelmed. Maui Family Support Services helps to reduce stress by showing families how to cope with stressful issues, by teaching positive parenting skills, and by connecting families to other appropriate community resources.

My thanks to our hard-working, dedicated Staff and Board. And once again, thanks to our community and Family of Friends for your continuing support. You can all be proud that your contribution has helped reduce stress for many families and allowed for basic human goodness to express itself.

I enrolled in MFSS when I was fifteen. A lady from the agency visited me in the hospital when I gave birth to my first child. She gave me pamphlets on parenting and on dealing with stress, which helped a lot, as I didn't know much about being a mother.

Another lady from MFSS named Stacey visited me a couple of weeks later. It was very nice to have her come to see how the baby and I were doing. I had a lot of questions about parenting. I could have talked to my parents, but this was different . . . I felt like I was talking to a friend that I could confide in. During the years to come, I didn't consider Stacy as my "worker", but as a very close friend.

I still went to school because I was determined to graduate. A couple of months after I gave birth, I was pregnant again, and MFSS helped a lot during those hard times. Most of all, Stacey's visits meant that I could talk about any problems that I had, with someone who would understand what I was going through and who would help me in a positive way.

After I graduated from high school and moved out of my parents' home, I still had the agency to help me. I remember going to MFSS family parties and beach days. The kids would have lots of fun with games and prizes, while learning things in a positive way. I enjoyed it because it was a chance for me to talk with other moms and share experiences. It was a chance to relax and learn new things. There was frequently an interesting speaker; I love to listen to people who have wisdom they can share and help me in my area of need. And the food was great. Still is!

MFSS has taught me to be a positive person. By listening to their wisdom, I have grown to become a mature person. MFSS has given me and my family love, support and understanding. I think there are a lot of families out there who really need this kind of support. It's great to know that MFSS is still helping families. They have done a terrific job helping me and my family, and I'm proud to be a part of Maui Family Support Services.
