MFSS Board Member Comes Full Circle

well on her way.

"Both my parents were addicts and in and out of jail," she said. Her father is in federal prison on the Mainland for repeated felony offenses and her mother passed away under cloudy circumstances in 2006. Yet, she said, it was the highs and lows of her relationship with her mother that shaped her as an individual.

ShyAnn grew up in Honolulu and has six siblings who have three different fathers. As a small child, she would stay with her

grandmother while her mother was out drinking and having brushes with the law. She said her mother would clean up, take ShyAnn back into her home and then relapse. "I remember waking up many times and having no idea where I was," she said.

At age 7, an event shocked her mother into turning ShyAnn and two sisters in to Child Protective Services. "She left me somewhere and I was

ShyAnn and Kekoa molested," she said. Over the next six years, she would find herself in and out of six foster homes. Yet her love for her mother lout of remained constant. "It was an instinct," she said. on the "I needed to be with her. Wherever she was, that nd her was home."

When her mother was transferred to Maui Community Correctional Center, ShyAnn followed her to Maui. It seemed her mother's life might be continued on page 12

Teen Voices, Fatherhood Involvement Team and Raising Our Keiki's Keiki


Maui Family Support Services supports the entire family. In addition to providing services for new mothers, MFSS has developed programs to assist teens, fathers and grandparents raising their children.

Leinell Coloma-Nahoohikaika coordinates Teen Voices, which works to prevent unplanned pregnancies, offer prenatal and parenting support and prevent drug and alcohol abuse for teens age 11 to 19. The program offers "talk story" sessions after school for singles, couples and keiki.

Fatherhood Involvement Team (FIT) Coordinator Roy DeLyon supports dads and male caregivers who want to be an active, positive force in the lives of their children. Groups meet to learn personal and parenting skills, how to support moms and mothers to be, and how children grow and develop. Issues and challenges are explored to strengthen fathers' skills they need to be positive role models for their children.

The challenges of today's economy often force parents to make difficult choices regarding their families. More and more, grandparents find themselves raising their grandchildren. Raising our Keiki's Keiki (ROKK), coordinated by Patty Paranada, allows a forum for grandparents in this role to learn invaluable skills for parenting the second time around. Monthly group meetings focus on support and issues unique to this group including guiding them to make good choices, recognizing signs of substance abuse and more.

MFSS believes treating the whole family is the most effective way to prevent child abuse and neglect and strengthen the family. We wish to acknowledge Leinell, Roy and Patty for the outstanding work they do on behalf of the participants! MA-HALO!

MFSS Services Impact Families...

Early Head Start

Early Head Start offers services for infants and toddlers through home-based and center-based options, which are family oriented and family driven. The program supports families by providing quality child care and child development services at no cost to parents so parents can work or attend school and become self-sufficient. The Early Head Start program is funded by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families and the County of Maui.

EHS Home-Based

The Home-Based option offers weekly home visits and twice monthly group activities to support families and children. Prenatal services are provided to expectant mothers and fathers, promoting healthy pregnancies and supportive postpartum care for the parent and child. The program helps the families to connect with services they may not otherwise access. With continuous enrollment, the EHS Home-Based option is open to income-eligible, pregnant women and families with children up to age thirty-six months,

including children with special needs. Contact Kuuipo at 242-0900 ext. 236.

EHS Child Development Program

The Center-Based, *Kupukupu* Program offers a Child Development and Child Care Center and newly-remodeled playground. Kupukupu means "surge forth and grow, such as a young fern." The Kupukupu Program is offered for income-eligible children six weeks to age thirty-six months, whose parents are working or going to school. MFSS thanks the Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation, which has provided a \$100,000 Endowment Fund, exclusively for maintenance and repair of the Child Development Center building.

The program has also received funding from the County of Maui, Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Foundation, Hotel Industry Funds (Charity Walk) and community contributions. Contact Denise at 242-0900 ext. 259.

Fatherhood Involvement Team

MFSS believes in providing programs and services that benefit and strengthen the entire family.

The Fatherhood Involvement Team (FIT) promotes the role of males in the lives of their Keiki by providing group presentations and activities to fathers and male caregivers of all ages, with children of all ages, or fathers-to-be.

Services provide one-on-one and group support, information on healthy relationships, communication skills, increasing positive peer relations, parenting, child development, pregnancy prevention, and sexual health. Services are free, confidential and voluntary.

Fathers and their Keiki attended the MFSS Fatherhood Celebration last June at Queen Kaahumanu Shopping Center. Dads from Maui County were honored for working to serve as role models for their children. Contact Roy at 242-0900 ext. 279.

Teen Voices

Teen Voices provides free and confidential "talk story" sessions for youth ages 11 to 19 and addresses relevant teen issues through group presentations to school health classes, after school programs, youth groups and other service programs. Services are designed to prevent teen pregnancy and to provide pregnant and

parenting teens with skills needed to raise safe and healthy children.

Groups are also held by Teen Voices at the MFSS office, or excursions to other locations, such as the beach, and include snacks and great information! Topics include early childhood development and parenting skills, strengthening life skills, communica-

tion skills, increasing knowledge of drug use prevention, increasing positive peer relations and influences, promoting healthy lifestyle choices and reproductive health information for prevention of pregnancy and sexually transmitted infections (STI). Contact Leinell at 242-0900 ext. 266.

Outreach and Resource Specialists (OARS)

When a child is born at Maui Memorial Medical Center (MMMC), MFSS interviews new parents and provides critical resource and referral information to the family on child care, food and shelter and other basic needs.

The mother and other family members are invited to meet with our highly-trained Outreach and Resource Specialists. In a non-threatening manner, family members are asked questions and talk story about family and child needs as well as family issues. Families are offered MFSS services as well as those offered by other community resources.

MFSS has provided this service for 20 vears. The two staffers who conduct the interviews have a combined total of 29 years in the program. Hospital staff and new parents consistently share how vital they believe this program to be.

Our organization is working hard to dispel the old, common saying, "Babies don't come with an owner's manual." On Maui, they do, and we provide it.

The "Keiki 'O Hawaii" publication, developed by the Hawaii Department of Health, provides invaluable information tracking the safety, development, health, nutrition, emotional and physical development and family interaction of the child in monthly increments form birth through age three. Parents are given information to measure their child's progress against minimum standards developed through years of research and practice.

Last year, the economic downturn took its toll when funding for programs in Maui County were cut. The MFSS Board of Directors stepped forward, working with staff to find additional resources to keep the program afloat through the end of the Contact Michelle at 242.0900 vear. ext 265.

Enhanced Healthy Start

Enhanced Healthy Start is an early intervention program for families with children up to three years old. Services

Good Beginnings, in conjunction with Maui County's Early Childhood Resource Coordinator, works to provide a coordinated, early care and education system for young children, birth to age eight years old.

Good Beginnings is guided by a comprehensive plan under the leadership of the Good Beginnings Community Council. The Council includes fifteen members who represent various Maui programs that work with families of young children.

Located at 251 Napua St. in Wailuku, the Good Beginnings Maui County Early Childhood Resource Center provides resource and referral information to families on early childhood topics, including child care subsidy programs. It facilitates the Maui County Child Care Subsidy program for working families who do not qualify for other assistance programs due to income limits.

Good Begin

nership with over 50 other early childhood agencies, coordinated registration for Dolly Parton's Imagination Library free book program in Maui County. Children ages birth to 4 1/2 years and living on Maui, Molokai or Lanai can register through Good Beginnings or one of their partnering agencies to receive one free hardcover book each month until they reach the age of five.

Good Beginnings also sponsors a family child interaction learning program at Makawao School for children one to four years old and their parents or caregivers. The Program also collaborates with the Department of Education to provide Summer Transition to Kindergarten classes for children who have had little or no preschool experience. Raising Our Keiki's Keiki

Raising Our Keiki's Keiki (ROKK) is a support group for grandparents who are raising or caregivers to their grandchildren. The program provides support for grandparents who are facing the many challenges and joyous moments that come with parenting the second time around.

Monthly meetings focus on providing support for grandchildren, access to community resources, education on drug abuse prevention and dealing with the highs and lows of parenting in today's world. Contact Patty at 242-0900, ext. 270.

Ohana Support Services

The Ohana Support Services Team provides a number of critical programs that strengthen the family. Among the team's services and activities:

Home Visiting – Ohana Support Services features Child Development Specialists and Clinical Specialists who serve pregnant women and families with infants less than three years old on to enhance parenting skills, promote bonding and attachment and healthy child development and improve family support systems. These and other highly trained staff focus on identifying families at risk for child abuse and neglect. Over the past four years, there has been no abuse reported for more than 99% of families enrolled in the program for one year.

Groups – A number of group activities and programs address specific family challenges:

KULIA uses the art of Hula to focus on support for families interested in Hawaiian cultures and practices. Topics include ohana family strengthening, being pono, (doing what is right) and understanding the Hawaiian language. Contact Makana at 242.0900, ext. 246.

GROWING INFANTS GROUP (GIG) is a "how to" program that stresses learning and doing together for care givers and infants. Topics such as health and wellness, parenting and playing and growth and development are addressed in monthly meetings. Contact Darlyn at 242.0900, ext.282.

"MEET ME IN THE PARK" is a play group for toddlers age one to three years that meets monthly at Keopuolani Park in Central Maui and at Kalama Park Playground in Kihei. This group encourages parent and child interaction promoting early childhood learning through cognitive, social and physical play. Contact Darlyn at 242.0900, ext. 282.

SUPPORT FOR PARENTS OF TWINS (SPOT) addresses the special joys and challenges associated with raising twins, triplets and other multiple births. The group meets at the MFSS office monthly to provide parenting tips, meet and share experiences with other parents. Contact Edel at 242-0900, ext. 227.

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changing. Her mother was released, became a Christian, married and won custody of her daughter.

But she soon relapsed and ShyAnn began to follow the same path. "I was rebellious," she said. "I was angry and couldn't understand why she chose drugs and alcohol over me." ShyAnn began drinking and partying, too. "I was sad," she said. "I just never seemed to fit in anywhere."

During a period of sobriety, ShyAnn's mother had befriended a young man who had been down on his luck and had also endured a troubled childhood. "My mom introduced me to my baby's future father," she said. ShyAnn and Ryan Miguel have been together ever since.

On their own at age 17, the couple tried to make their way in the world. They had nothing but each other. For two months, they lived in their car while Ryan worked days painting houses and nights as a security guard. Finally, they saved enough money, sold their car and rented a small cottage. By age 18, ShyAnn was pregnant.

When ShyraRose was born at Maui Memorial Hospital in 2004, ShyAnn remembers talking with someone from an agency about her new baby and her circumstances, but she did not

pursue services. "We didn't want to go on welfare or get help," she said. It wouldn't be until her second child was born two years later that she would connect with the agency that would become her passion – Maui Family Support Services. "When Kekoa was born, an MFSS Early Head Start Parent-Child Educator spoke with me again," she said. This time, ShyAnn signed up for the agency's homebased services.

Almost immediately, she said, her family's fortunes began to turn around. Her counselor gave her important tips on everything from how to hold and nurture her baby to the importance of providing nutritional food. "Sometimes, she would even go to the food bank and bring me a box of food," said ShyAnn. She learned about other important programs and services at MFSS and resources in the community.

"Finally, we had stability," said ShyAnn. "MFSS put us on track. They taught us to set positive, reachable goals." Ryan became a full-time union painter and when Kekoa began attending the MFSS child development center, ShyAnn was able to go to work full-time at Denny's.

But she wanted to give back. "I was so impressed with MFSS," she said. "They

answered my questions before I even asked. I was amazed." She had heard about the MFSS Policy Council which works with staff to assure parent involvement in policy-making decisions. After joining the group, "She really blossomed," said MFSS Early Head Start Director Edel Baguio-Larena. "At first, she was pretty quiet but before long, she was very active and involved."

In 2007, ShyAnn became chair of the council. MFSS Chief Executive Officer L. Jani Sheppard was so impressed with her determination and abilities, she began talking with ShyAnn about joining the agency Board of Directors. ShyAnn joined the board in 2008.

"MFSS helped me through some very difficult times," she said, including the sudden, tragic death of her mother. "This organization has been a big stepping stone for me and my family. Change is scary, but it's good when it's positive and when you are in the right place with good people. With the help of MFSS, Ryan and I have committed to being very active in the lives of our children. We are very happy together. Life is good."
